#### **Grants Committee Convenes**

The newly formed Grants Committee is scheduled to meet on **February 19**<sup>th</sup> at the Center for Dramatic Art. Co-chairs McKay Coble and Robert Long will lead the trustees through the history of grant making at the Foundation since 1984 and then discuss the 15 grant requests that were received at the Foundation office.

Grants will now come under **One Committee** and include: Human Rights,

Arts, Publications and Special Grants.

The members, who will develop the criteria for grant making, have been given a "Tabula rasa," the Latin term that equates to the English "blank slate" or "scraped tablet" (which refers to writing on a slate sheet in chalk) but comes from the Roman tabula or wax tablet, used for notes, which was blanked by heating the wax and smoothing it to give a tabula rasa." **Good Luck!** 

We directed her to the Southern Historical Collection to access Paul's diaries from that period. The documentary will follow the lives of Americans soldiers during the last eight months of WWI. All of them were connected in one way or another with the 27<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> American Divisions which fought under the British in Belgium and France in the final months of the war. These divisions helped to break the supposedly impregnable Hindenburg Line. The documentary uses the actual words of the individuals taken from their letters, diaries, books and historical monographs.
